You'll see on our website the phrase "Spreading the Peace of Christ," and that is what we strive to do in a wide variety of ways: many annual events, some new and some unique, some of our own initiative and some in collaboration with others. Here is just a sampling of how we spread the Peace of Christ over the past year:

In observance of UN International Peace Day, we presented *Dorothy Day: Communion of Faith and Action in the Pursuit of Peace*. Martha Hennessy, peace activist and granddaughter of Dorothy Day, and Robert Ellsberg, publisher of Orbis Books and editor of several works by and about Dorothy Day, were our speakers.

We held an Interfaith Prayer Service for the Total Elimination of Nuclear Weapons on the UN International Day of the same name.

In November, Dr. Kevin Ahern hosted our Fall Assembly at Manhattan College (MC). Entitled *Choosing Gospel Nonviolence in a Time of Terror and Turmoil*, our keynote speakers were Robert Brimlow, author of *What about Hitler?* and Judy Coode, Coordinator of the Catholic Nonviolence Initiative.

Our Director spoke to Catholic High School Religion Chairpersons to promote our Maloof Family Young Peacebuilder Award,

We issued our annual anti-war toy flier for the holiday season with the message: "We must choose between the violence of adults

*and the smiles of children”* by Elie Wiesel.

Our Human Rights Day/Feast of the Holy Innocents event, titled *Home is a Human Right*, focused on immigration. Sr. Mary Beth Moore, SC, Assistant Coordinator of Centro Corazon de Maria on Long Island, and Mario Russell, Director of Catholic Charities Immigrant and Refugee Services in the Archdiocese of NY, spoke.

Peacemaking through the Arts featured a wonderful a cappella quartet called *Windborne* whose music carried a social justice message consistent with PCMNY’s mission.

Our Director gave a prophetic reflection on Jesus’s call to “Repent and believe in the Gospel” at a Peace Mass at Sacred Heart Church in Bayside, Queens.

We organized two vigils for the closing of Guantanamo prison in January and February.

The Lenten Reflection we circulated on Ash Wednesday highlighted the synchronicity of Ash Wednesday and Valentine’s Day. It noted how love is the defining meaning behind Ash Wednesday and all of Lent.

At a Pax Christi International (PCI) Reception in February, our Director joined Marie Dennis, co-president of PCI, and Sister Patty Chappell, Executive Director of PCUSA, to report on the wonderful work of Pax Christi from NYC to the world.

In early March, Mary Anne Muller led us on a Lenten retreat with the intriguing title, *I have met God—And She cannot be contained!*

On separate occasions, our Director and two Board members addressed students at the College of Mount St. Vincent and Manhattan College about our peacemaking endeavors.

We processed across Manhattan at our 36<sup>th</sup> consecutive Good Friday Way of the Cross.

This year’s Council of Ecclesial Movements’ Day of Reflection raised the question, *Where Have You Taken My Lord?* Our Director responded from a peace perspective.

When the U.S. launched the latest missile on Syria, PCMNY held a Prayer Vigil for peace in Syria across from the UN.

PCMNY and Sacred Heart Bayside co-sponsored an uplifting book talk with David Maloof, patron of the Maloof Family Young Peacebuilder Award and author of *Christianity Matters: How over Two Millennia the Meek and the Merciful Revolutionized Civilization--and Why it Needs to Happen Again*.

At this year’s Peacemaker Awards Reception, we honored four of the greatest leaders in anti-nuclear weapons activism: Sisters Carol Gilbert, Ardeth Platte, and Megan Rice, and Michael Walli. We also honored Sisters Virginia Dorgan and Kathleen Kanet for their years of leadership in the Network for Peace through Dialogue, and we recognized our latest Young Peacebuilders, Grace Aulisa, Brigit Lapolla, and Juliet Kulusic.

From July 1<sup>st</sup> to August 9<sup>th</sup> we shared in a Fast for Christian Nonviolence framed by opening and closing prayer services.

In commemoration of the Hiroshima and Nagasaki atomic bombings, our Director spoke at the Manhattan Project for a Nuclear-Free World action outside the Japanese Consulate. She also spoke at an Interfaith Gathering which followed our annual Hiroshima/Nagasaki public witness.

On the lighter side, several of us enjoyed our annual summer picnic in Central Park.

We continued to facilitate “First Steps” conflict resolution workshops for the EOP class at Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of New York.

Our local groups provided additional ways to pray, study, and act for peace.

And, looking beyond PCMNY, we participated in conference calls with PCUSA about Israel/Palestine, nuclear abolition, and regional concerns; webinars on a variety of current events; and endorsements of statements and letters on such issues as global climate change and economic justice. We also joined colleagues in their marches and rallies to celebrate diversity, to ban the wall, and to oppose gun violence and war.
